Chairman's Comments

Your executive committee have been busy lately with regular two-monthly teleconference calls to deal with the various major projects the Institute is involved in this year. RNZIH Conference on Urban Biodiversity

To be held in Christchurch 21-24 October, this has proved to be a timely topic with a great deal of enthusiasm shown, both from experts offering to present papers and interested parties in attending. Generous sponsorship has enabled us to invite keynote speakers from Australia, Singapore and the UK. The venue can hold 250 people and already, mainly through the RNZIH website, more than 160 have expressed interest in attending. You'll find registration details in this newsletter – if this is a topic you're interested in, it would be a good idea to register early.

Banks Memorial Lecture

This free public lecture sponsored by RNZIH will also be held in Christchurch, to coincide with the conference. Colin Meurk of Landcare Research, Lincoln will present the 2003 Banks Lecture, *Cities are Cultural and Ecological Keys to Biodiversity Futures*, in the auditorium of Christchurch Girl's High School, commencing 7.30pm on Wednesday 22 October. Spread the word, everyone is welcome.

RNZIH New Zealand Gardens Trust

As mentioned in the last newsletter the New Zealand Gardens Trust (NZGT) has been formed. The Board of Trustees has now met twice and the work of getting NZGT up and running is well in hand. Two further trustees have been appointed, Bev McConnell of Ayrlies, Whitford and Gordon Collier of Taupo. Bev and Gordon's role is to be as garden assessors, and two more qualified people to carry out this task would be hard to find. They intend to start visiting those gardens that have applied to be members in the next few weeks. NZGT has been funded through donations from Founding Gardens and other contributions - thanks to all those concerned for your generosity and support in this project. Look for a more detailed account of the workings of NZGT and a list of the Founding Gardens and contributors in your next issue of the New Zealand Garden Journal.

Training

The Institute has been approached by the NZ Horticultural Industry Training Organisation (HITO) with a view to RNZIH having input into training. The executive are unanimously agreed this is an area where we could, and should, play a role. A discussion paper from Mike Finlayson, HITO chief executive, was tabled at our last meeting. A working party has been formed to examine ways RNZIH and HITO can form a working partnership which maintains the integrity of both organisations yet benefits horticultural training in general.

Website

This continues to grow from strength to strength. More information is added as webmaster Murray Dawson finds time from his already busy schedule. RNZIH information, the latest updates on this year's conference, articles, book reviews, plant information – the list goes on and on. And there are links to many other related websites. Don't forget that the RNZIH Notable Trees New Zealand database is also online – look for the links from our main site (rnzih.org.nz). And a big

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thankyou to Landcare Research, Lincoln who recently generously agreed to host our website on their server.

Canterbury Conservationist wins Loder Cup

Lifetime champion of New Zealand's native plants, Dr Gerry McSweeney, has been awarded the prestigious Loder Cup award for 2003.

Announcing this award, Conservation Minister Chris Carter said:

"Dr McSweeney has made a significant contribution to preserving New Zealand's native flora.

His work has included close involvement in the creation of the Department of Conservation, the establishment of the South West New Zealand World Heritage Area, winning a halt to forest clearance and wetland drainage, the signing of the West Coast Forest Accord and the Tasman Forest Accord.

Dr McSweeney was on the Government's expert panel on the future management of the 130,000 hectares of Timberlands West Coast native forests, with an outcome that all of the forests were added to public conservation lands.

His advocacy for tussock grasslands has led to the establishment of the Korowai/Torlesse Tussocklands Park.

Since 1990 Dr McSweeney has been instrumental as a member of the Nature Heritage Fund in protecting 180,000 hectares of conservation land.

These are some of the contributions which demonstrate how Dr McSweeney's outstanding leadership and campaigning skills have resulted in the protection of large tracts of native flora in perpetuity for all New Zealanders.

Dr McSweeney's energy and passion for the indigenous flora of New Zealand extends to his private business, where he has set an important example to the industry that conservation and sensitive tourism can be compatible.

It is a great pleasure to be able to give recognition to members of the community, like Dr McSweeney, who make huge contributions to conservation."

The Loder Cup is one of New Zealand's oldest conservation awards. It is awarded annually by the Minister of Conservation for outstanding contributions to the conservation of New Zealand's native plant life.

Last year's winner was Miss Marge Maddren of Whangarei.
