ABBREVIATIONS

"E" = EVERGREENS: Usually despatched balled or in pots.

"D" = DECIDUOUS: Usually despatched in bundles.

= NEW RELEASES & LISTINGS: Black border around plant name.

HEIGHTS = These are shown in metric and are approximate only.

They represent what we consider the average height would be under normal garden conditions for shrubs in 5 years, and trees in 15 years.

Please use as a guide only.

DELIVERY OF ORDERS

In order to assist in your garden planting plans we include in our catalogue a plant despatch guide.

The periods set out below represent the times we consider optimum for plant despatch. It is not our intention to preclude customers from ordering plants to be despatched at times other than the periods shown. We, therefore, intend you to use these dates as a guide only.

- OPEN GROUND GROWN—DECIDUOUS STOCK i.e., Apples, Pears, Peaches, Plums, Silver Birch, Maples etc.—JUNE/JULY. Despatch period—A late leaf fall may delay these dates.
- OPEN GROUND GROWN—EVERGREEN STOCK i.e. Conifers Camellias, Rhododendrons, Pieris etc. JUNE/JULY/AUGUST. Despatch period—Could be affected by delays to our undercutting operations, progress of which depends upon the prevailing weather conditions. These local climatic conditions tend to vary considerably from year to year.
- CONTAINER GROWN STOCK—Plants grown by this method are planned to be available at varying times of the year and can be planted at any time, provided normal plant maintenance is carried out.
- ROSES—We normally handle Roses as separate orders from other plants and wherever possible despatch during the JUNE/JULY/ AUGUST period.
- EVERGREEN HIBISCUS & BOUGAINVILLEA—Not usually ready for despatch until warmer weather prevails therefore, expected despatch period would be DECEMBER/JANUARY.

It must be understood that plant growth cannot be made to fit completely into man-made schedules and many variable factors must be accounted for during the normal growing period; which can affect our seasonal plant despatching dates.

Confirmed orders are still subject to shortages, crop failure or other factors beyond our control. As far as practicable, orders are despatched strictly in order of receipt.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS USED ABOVE

OPEN GROUND GROWN—Refers to plants grown in nursery rows outside in the soil.

CONTAINER GROWN STOCK—Refers to plants grown from start to finish in containers, situated outside or under shade in a special area exclusive to container plants.

ROSES—Grown as an open ground crop.

HIBISCUS & BOUGAINVILLEA—Grown as container crops.

DECIDUOUS—Plants that drop their leaves in the Autumn and remain dormant during the winter period.

EVERGREEN-Plants carrying foliage all year round.

UNDERCUTTING—An operation carried out some weeks prior to lifting plants grown in open ground. Whereby we cut by machine or hand the plants main root system to alleviate shock and promote new root growth.

Ornamental Trees and Shrubs

The term "ornamental trees and shrubs" covers a wide group of important and interesting plants from every corner of the world, so adaptable that they can virtually occupy the whole garden. They can be placed to give spaciousness, be massed for effect, or stand alone as specimens. Likewise, they are stalwarts of shade and shelter.

- ABELIA. Hardy evergreen shrubs with attractive foliage, suitable for specimen planting, ornamental hedges, ground cover or banks; will thrive anywhere.

- ACER. MAPLE. Maples comprise a group of deciduous trees and shrubs famous for their ornate leaves, coloured barks and vivid spring or autumn colours. While they will tolerate a wide range of conditions a cool rich root run would be their first preference and shelter from strong wind.
 - CAPPADOCICUM AUREUM. D. 3m. New growth in spring is bright coppery-red turning later to rich butter-yellow. \$4.75
 - FORRESTII. D. 6m. Beautiful small tree with striated bark. Young stems coral red. \$4.75

MORRISONENSE. D. 5m. Triangular, serrated leaves 5-6cm long. Rich Autumn colours. Attractive 'SNAKE-BARK'. \$5.50

NEGUNDO. D. 9m. BOX ELDER. Rapid growing shade tree. Yellow green flowers. \$4.00

ARGENTEO VARIEGATUM. D. 6m. SILVER BOX ELDER. Silver variegated leaves. \$4.75

N. ELEGANTISSIMUM. D. 6m. GOLDEN BOX ELDER. Golden leaves. \$4.75

PLATANOIDES. D. 7m. NORWAY MAPLE. Good shade tree golden yellow autumn foliage. \$4.00

P. CRIMSON KING. D. 4m. GOLDSWORTH PURPLE. The bold handsome foliage is mahogany crimson when young changing to metallic dark coppery purple similar to River's Copper Beech. \$7.00

ACER PALMATUM. JAPANESE MAPLE. The Japanese Maples ranging from dwarf to sizeable specimens; are grown for their vivid Spring or Autumn colours and coloured barks. Some are weepers in greens, crimson and purple, others tall or spreading. All are dainty and neat in habit. Protection from strong

winds is necessary and hot dry corners should be avoided.

- AZALEAS. The Azaleas are divided into two main groups, Evergreens which include the Indicas, Kurumes and Gumpos and the deciduous varieties Mollis and Occidentalis. Botanically they are within the Rhododendron family and require similar conditions. When planted in groups in semi-shade they are at their best, though many varieties will grow well in full sun. Moist but well drained loamy soil enriched with peat or humus is recommended. Avoid lime.
- AZALEA GUMPO. LILLIPUTIAN AZALEA. This group is the smallest growing of the evergreen azaleas seldom more than 30cm high, and are ideal for rockeries where the surroundings set off their closely tufted foliage and large open trumpets.

MING. Brilliant tangerine orange. Large florets. Early to mid-season.



They appreciate protection from hot afternoon sunshine and prefer peaty soils with cool root conditions. An abundance of water is essential during the flowering season. Plants should be cut back to about half the length of each stem just above a strong pair of buds in winter. The depth of colour in Hydrangeas is influenced by nature of the soil. Acid soils favour blue shades, while alkaline soils favour pink and red shades. Usually the deeper the reds or pinks, the deeper the corresponding blue will be produced in acid soils. To encourage reds and pinks lime should be added to the soil and for blues sulphate of iron, alum or flowers of sulphur may be used.

Citrus are generally hardier than is supposed, and, provided shelter from cutting winds, a reasonably good soil and full sun are provided, good results may be expected in most districts. Lisbon and Eureka Lemons succeed in North Island gardens sheltered from heavy frosts. Meyer Lemon gives best results in colder districts. Oranges and Mandarins will prosper in all mild districts. With citrus, particularly Oranges and Mandarins, the fruit borne on young trees is usually disappointing, thick skinned and dry fleshed, but as the tree establishes the fruit becomes larger, thinner skinned and full of juice.

All citrus resent deep cultivation; their fine feeding surface roots dislike disturbance. A well-drained soil, annual mulching with decayed farmyard manure, compost or the like is required.

Although our stock of citrus trees is certified clean and disease free by the Department of Agriculture, Government prohibit citrus trees being sent into the Northland, Auckland Provinces and Hawke's Bay County from other parts of New Zealand. We regret therefore that we cannot supply citrus to clients in these areas.

HANDLING PLANTS ON ARRIVAL

With all plants there are important basic rules for handling to ensure results.

ON ARRIVAL: Partially unpack your order and keep in a moist, shady, draught-free position until you are ready to plant. Soak balled or potted items for a few minutes if planting is to be delayed. Always plant promptly but avoid adverse weather conditions, particularly high winds. If there is delay ensure your plants do not become dry. Your order will arrive adequately packed for its time in transit in one or more of the following ways:—

- (1) AS A BALLED PLANT: i.e. wrapped in hessian or similar material and tied with twine.
- (2) GROWING IN A PLASTIC POT OR BAG.
- (3) BARE ROOT, packed in wet moss or shavings, and wrapped in hessian or polythene.

PLANTING: Each method requires a little different handling. Although plants generally survive the most casual approach, correct preparation prior to planting pays dividends.

4 to 8 weeks in advance, dig the ground thoroughly adding soil conditioners where necessary such as farmyard manure, compost, peat, leaf mould, seaweed, etc. These conditions can be further improved by adding Blood and Bone at the rate of 1 kg to a large barrowful.

A balanced fertiliser at least three weeks before planting is also beneficial, i.e. 2 parts Superphosphate, 1 part Sulphate of Potash, 1 part Sulphate of Ammonia, applied at 113 grams per square metre.

When planting ensure that the hole is larger than the root system, plant to the soil mark showing on the plant's stem, and firm well. If staking is necessary, position these before planting to avoid root damage. In exposed positions temporary shelter should be provided using polythene, hessian or similar, until the plant is established. Then handle the different types in the following manner:—

(1) BALLED PLANTS

(a) Cut and remove twine.

(b) Roll back hessian from top. If it adheres to root structure, plant with plant, otherwise remove carefully.

(2) PLANTS IN POTS OR BAGS

- (a) Ease, cut or tear away container, ensuring that the fine roots are not damaged. If pot will not come away easily, soak for a few minutes.
- (b) If roots have started to spiral around pot carefully unravel.
- (c) Place plant upright in prepared hole, fill with soil and firm well.

(3) ROOTS BARE OF SOIL (mainly deciduous plants)

(a) Remove from wrapping material.

(b) If any roots have been damaged in transit, trim with secateurs.

(c) Form a slight mound in bottom of hole.

(d) Place upright, spreading roots evenly and around this mound, fill with soil and firm well,

Blooms are carried high on firm stems, and last well over a long period. This rose has proved to be a vigorous variety and develops into a densely foliaged healthy bush covered in bloom.
