This cup is awarded annually to a raiser whose hybridization programme within a particular genus or single species has resulted in the recent introduction and availability of new hardy hybrids of merit. The Awards Advisory Committee viewed Keith's ongoing work with dahlias to be more than worthy for this award.

## Trevor Davies elected a Life Member of the Friends, Auckland Botanic Gardens

Congratulations to Trevor Davies who was recently elected a Life-Member of the Friends, Auckland Botanic Gardens. He is a most worthy recipient of life membership as he has had a long and distinguished involvement with the Gardens and with horticulture in general. He served for more than 20 years on the Executive of the NZ Nurserymen's Association including a term as President. He is also a member of the New Plymouth City Council and in 1966 was President of Floral Festivals (Taranaki Inc.).

Trevor studied for a Diploma of Horticultural Science at Massey College and then joined the family firm of Duncan and Davies, of which he was later to be managing Director for nearly 20 years. After moving to Auckland in 1976 he worked with Zealandia for two years before becoming committed to the genus *Wisteria*.

Trevor was "persuaded" to join the Friends in 1976, and he served as fourth President. Particularly notable has been his work for the Shrub Evaluation Panel, of which he is currently Chairman. He was also noted for running remarkably short meetings. It is gratifying to see his service recognised.

## 2009 RNZIH BANKS MEMORIAL LECTURE (a free public lecture)

# The amazing story of Dunedin's Chinese Garden by Douglas (Mick) Field

The Banks Memorial Lecture this year focuses on the new Dunedin Chinese Garden.

The Banks Memorial Lecture is a *free* lecture open to the public. It commemorates Sir Joseph Banks, botanist on Captain Cook's first voyage to New Zealand. During a later distinguished scientific career, he was Director of the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, London.



Douglas (Mick) Field will share his personal and professional involvement with the development of the Dunedin Chinese Garden. This should be of great interest to the local public, members of the



RNZIH and the New Zealand Gardens Trust, and also those people visiting Dunedin and Cromwell for the NZGT Conference on the weekend of the 24th April.

Some previous Banks Lectures have focused on the more scientific and technical facets of botany and horticulture so, with more of a "garden" emphasis, Mick Field will share with us the story of how the Chinese Garden was conceived and brought to completion as a special exercise of achievement in all the fields of politics, plants, people and of course his own expertise. This insight into a specialised area of landscape garden design will certainly provide some inspiration and also better understanding of what has been created in Dunedin.

#### **Biography:**

Douglas Field, who will deliver the 2009 RNZIH Banks Memorial Lecture, has a long and varied career in the world of horticulture.

Having completed an apprenticeship at Christchurch Botanic Gardens in the early 1950s, Douglas went on to study for a National Diploma in Horticulture before going to England where he continued his horticultural studies at Wisely and Lower Basildon.

Returning to New Zealand in 1962 he again worked in Christchurch where he designed and built several parks/sports-fields.

From Christchurch he moved to Australia where he was involved in construction of the Mt Lofty Botanic garden, design work at the Adelaide Botanic Garden and the teaching of students.

From Adelaide, Douglas moved back to New Zealand, working from 1971 for the Dunedin Parks and Recreation Department as a Landscape Architect. Following local body reform in 1987 he was appointed Recreation Planning Manager. In 1988 he was made a Fellow of the NZ Institute of Parks and Recreation Administration.

His work in Dunedin has included input into the development strategy for the Otago Harbour, boat harbour development, cemetery design, the establishment of Polytechnic Training for Ornamental Horticulture and numerous community amenities, latterly as a private consultant. His involvement in the establishment of the Dunedin Chinese Garden started 13 years ago when the idea was first mooted.

## **RNZIH Education Trust update**

The 2008 NZ HITO Young Horticulturist of the Year (YHOTY) competition wound up on a high note with NGIA (Nursery & Garden Industry Association) representative Jason Green of Rainbow Park Nurseries in Auckland taking out the big prize, just narrowly edging out Jim Smith (Fruit) in second place and Toby Potter (Vege) in third.

NZHITO (New Zealand Horticulture Training Organisation) will again be naming sponsors for the 2009 competition, the organisation of which is well under way.

David Puflett's employment by the trust came to an end at the end of December 2008 following the NZHITO decision to carry out moderation and accreditation using their own staff this year. David has set up a consultancy and is doing contract work for a number of clients.

#### The Memorial Prize Fund

#### Purpose:

"To assist RNZIH members who are bone fide full or part time horticultural students with the costs of attending seminars, conferences or workshops that are being held within New Zealand."

#### The Fund:

The Memorial Prize Fund is made up from a number of previous RNZIH awards. These were: Rita Skellerup Prize, David Tannock Memorial Prize, Dugald McKenzie Prize, Junior Memorial Prize.

#### Eligibility:

Any financial member of the RNZIH who has been a member for a minimum period of one year and who is a registered full or part time horticultural student at an institution in New Zealand.

#### Conditions:

- 1. It is expected that the member would make a contribution towards the cost of attending the seminar/conference/workshop to demonstrate their commitment.
- 2. The RNZIH will consider applications for up to 75% of the cost of attending, including travel, registration and accommodation.
- Successful applicants must provide evidence of attending by way of receipts or other papers following the event. Failure to comply with this condition the applicant shall be liable to refund all award moneys to the RNZIH.

The National Executive of the RNZIH reserves the right not to make an award if in its opinion the application is not of sufficient merit, or for any other reason National Executive may decide from time to time.

#### Applications:

Applications should be submitted at least **two months** prior to the conference, seminar or workshop.

## The Peter Skellerup Plant Conservation Scholarship

#### Purpose:

"To assist with the conservation of the exotic and indigenous plant resource in New Zealand"

#### Objective:

The Scholarship will be granted for research field work, publication, propagation, protection and/or cultivation of plants, production of educational resources, and any other activity likely to promote and assist the conservation of New Zealand's indigenous and exotic plant genetic resources.

The main criterion shall be the value of the work in conserving a plant or group of plants, especially those that are threatened. Plants include trees.

#### Eligibility:

Applicants must be New Zealand residents or citizens. The Scholarship may involve travel and/or study

outside New Zealand. However, the work must be of benefit to the plant genetic resource within New Zealand.

#### Applications:

Applications must be typed on the appropriate form obtained from the Institute and lodged with the RNZIH no later than \*31 March. A synopsis of the proposed project must carry a statement of support by an acknowledged authority on the topic. Late applications will not be accepted.

#### **Plant Raisers' Award**

#### Objective:

The Award is granted to any nominated individual or organisation who has raised in New Zealand a cultivar considered to be sufficiently meritorious. The Award shall consist of an inscribed medal.

#### Note:

A cultivar is a cultivated plant which is distinguished by any characters significant for the purposes of horticulture and which when reproduced sexually or asexually retains its distinguishing features. The term 'cultivar' and 'variety' are synonymous for this award.

The requirements of the award are that:

- it should have been raised in New Zealand
- it should have been in cultivation for at least 3 years
- the cultivar should have been bred by seed

the cultivar should have been registered if it belongs to a genus registered by an International Registration Authority.

Nominations can be made by a Branch or by National Executive, any horticultural organisation affiliated to RNZIH, or any incorporate horticultural organisation.

Closing date: 1 November each year.

#### **Garden History Award**

(Award in Horticultural History and Conservation)

The aim of the award is to help focus Institute support for horticultural history and the conservation of cultivated plants, promote public interest in horticultural history and conservation, promote public awareness of the Institute, and encourage cooperation with other bodies such as the Historic Places Trust.

The award is granted to any nominated individual or organisation within New Zealand making distinguished contributions to horticultural history and conservation. The award is an inscribed medal similar to the Plant Raisers' Award. The contributions may include scholarly publications on any aspect of horticultural history or of the development of cultivated plants, studies on individual gardens, horticulturists or plants, projects on the conservation of cultivated plants, projects involving the conservation and/or restoration of gardens or garden structures.

Nominees need not be members of the Institute. Nominating bodies are the national Executive, any branch or affiliate of RNZIH, any incorporated horticultural organisation, or the Historic Places Trust or any branch thereof.

Closing date: 1 December each year.
