ORDERING We endeavour to handle orders in rotation, and therefore advise customers to place orders early. Demand on occasion exceeds supply, and we suggest that a list of plants that may be used as substitutes be included with the order or "tick" the panel provided and we will substitute where possible for you. Unavailable items will be carried forward to the following season if required. Your initials, name, address and telephone number clearly printed will facilitate handling of your order. When referring to a previous order, if possible, quote reference number.

MINIMUM ORDER: Due to the ever-increasing costs of materials and freight, we have found it necessary to make a surcharge of 50 cents on all orders under \$3.00 in value.

LARGE ORDER DISCOUNT: Orders from this catalogue exceeding \$20.00 in value entitle you to a 5% quantity discount

PAYMENT: Payment may be charged to your account but it is strictly nett and due for payment not later than the 20th of the month following date of despatch.

Botanical Names: Black capitals.

Common names (Various): Light capitals.

Synonyms: Light capitals

"E" = EVERGREEN: Usually despatched balled or in pots.

"D" = DECIDUOUS: Usually despatched in bundles.

HEIGHTS: These are approximate only, but are a guide to what we consider the average height would be under normal garden conditions in 15 years.

PRICES: These include packing and freight to your nearest railway station or equivalent.

OUR GUARANTEE: We do our best to ensure that at the time our plants leave our nursery they are true to name and healthy and provided they have not been damaged in transit and are planted promptly and are properly cared for and are not exposed to abnormal conditions, we guarantee to replace any plant which, within four months from the day of despatch from our nursery, is found to be not true to name or which does not live and grow. If no notification of any claim is received by us by the expiry of the period of four months then this guarantee ceases to be effective. Any other express or implied conditions, statements or warranties, statutory or otherwise, are in any event hereby excluded. If the purchaser does not wish to accept goods under the above conditions they are to be returned to us at once.

There are natives and exotics, deciduous and evergreens. There is fragrance, flamboyance, dignity, shape, form and colour. There is a plant for every place in your garden. Trees and shrubs promote healthy and serene surroundings on road sides, avenue, frontages or terraces. They have their place in parks, estates, city and suburban homes.

With all plants there are important basic rules for handling to ensure results.

ON ARRIVAL: Partially unpack your order and keep in a moist, shady, draught-free position until you are ready to plant. Soak balled or potted items for a few minutes if planting is to be delayed. Always plant promptly but avoid adverse weather conditions, particularly high winds. If there is delay ensure that your plants do not become dry. Your order will arrive adequately packed for its time in transit in one or more of the following ways:—

- AS A BALLED PLANT: i.e. wrapped in hessian or similar material and tied with twine.
- (2) GROWING IN A PLASTIC POT OR BAG.
- (3) BARE ROOT, packed in wet moss or shavings, and wrapped in hessian or polythene.

PLANTING: Each method requires a little different handling. Although plants generally survive the most casual approach, correct preparation prior to planting pays dividends.

4 to 8 weeks in advance, dig the ground thoroughly adding soil conditioners where necessary such as farmyard manure, compost, peat, leaf moulds, seaweed, etc. These conditions can be further improved by adding Blood and Bone at the rate of 2 lb. to a large barrowful.



A balanced fertiliser at least three weeks before planting is also beneficial, i.e. 2 parts Superphosphate, 1 part Sulphate of Potash, 1 part Sulphate of Ammonia, applied at 4 oz. per square yard.

When planting ensure that the hole is larger than the root system, plant to the soil mark showing on the plant's stem, and firm well. If staking is necessary, position these before planting to avoid root damage. In exposed positions temporary shelter should be provided using polythene, hessian or similar, until the plant is established. Then handle the different types in the following manner:

(1) BALLED PLANTS

- (a) Cut and remove twine.
- (b) Roll back hessian from top. If it adheres to root structure, plant with plant, otherwise remove carefully.
- (c) Place plant upright in prepared hole, fill with soil and firm well.

(2) PLANTS IN POTS OR BAGS

- (a) Ease, cut or tear away container, ensuring that the fine roots are not damaged. If pot will not come away easily, soak for a few minutes.
- (b) If roots have started to spiral around pot carefully unravel.
- (c) Place plant upright in prepared hole, fill with soil and firm well.

(3) ROOTS BARE OF SOIL (mainly deciduous plants)

- (a) Remove from wrapping material.
- (b) If any roots have been damaged in transit, trim with secateurs.
- (c) Form a slight mound in bottom of hole.
- (d) Place upright, spreading roots evenly and around this mound, fill with soil and firm well.

The term "ornamental trees and shrubs" covers a wide group of important and interesting plants from every corner of the world, so adaptable that they can virtually occupy the whole garden. They can be placed to give spaciousness, be massed for effect, or stand alone as specimens. Likewise, they are stalwarts of shade and shelter.

- ABELIA. Hardy evergreen shrubs with attractive foliage, suitable for specimen planting, ornamental hedges or ground cover for banks; will thrive anywhere.

- ACER. MAPLE. Maples comprise a group of deciduous trees and shrubs famous for their ornate leaves, coloured barks and their vivid spring or autumn colours. While they will tolerate a wide range of conditions a cool rich root run would be their first preference and shelter from strong wind.

- ACER PALMATUM. JAPANESE MAPLE. The Japanese Maples range from dwarfs to sizeable specimens; are grown for their vivid Spring or Autumn colours and coloured barks. Some are weepers in greens, crimsons and purples, others tall or spreading. All are dainty and neat in habit. Protection from strong winds is necessary and hot dry corners should be avoided.

- CHISHIO IMPROVED. D. 5ft. This new variety is more vigorous in growth than Chishio, has small translucent crimson-scarlet leaves in Spring turning green in Summer and red again in Autumn. Compact habit.
- COREANUM. D. 12ft. Specially selected for the brilliant crimsonscarlet foliage in late Autumn when other varieties have lost their leaves.

These rapid growing trees with light green feathery wattle-like foliage are especially suitable for hot dry districts with light well drained soil. Silk like pink flowers in profusion during Summer. \$2.00

ALNUS. ALDER. Very hardy attractive small trees adaptable to most soils and particularly useful for damp areas. Fast growing.

 - MONTEREY CARPET. E. 1ft. (JAMES ROOF). Low growing compact ground cover, glossy green leaves, pinkish-white flowers. \$2.00

RADIANT. E. 1ft. Mat-like shrub with glossy green leaves with pinkish-white flowers followed by large bright red berries in Autumn which remain on the plant most of the Winter. \$2.00

ARDISIA CRISPA. E. 3ft.

Sub-tropical dwarf growing berried shrub. Ideal for growing in shady spots and as an indoor decorative pot plant. Masses of scarlet berries persist throughout late Autumn and Winter. Frost tender. \$2.00

ASTARTEA FASCICULARIS PINKIE. E. 5ft.

A charming Australian shrub requiring open sunny position. Prune after flowering. Dainty white-blush-pink Ti-tree-like flowers. \$1.60

AUCUBA JAPONICA. JAPANESE LAUREL. Evergreen shrubs with large bold foliage suitable for under trees or shady places, will thrive in any garden soil. The scarlet-red berries are produced on the females only and the male plant is necessary for pollination. Excellent tub plant.

- AZALEAS. The Azaleas are divided into two main groups Evergreens which include the Indicas, Kurumes and Gumpos and the deciduous varieties Mollis and Occidentalis. Botanically they are within the Rhododendron family and require similar conditions. When planted in groups in semi-shade they are at their best, though many varieties will grow well in full sun. Moist but well drained loamy soil enriched with peat or humus is recommended. Avoid lime.
- AZALEA GUMPO. LILLIPUTIAN AZALEA. This group is the smallest of the evergreen azaleas seldom more than a foot high, and are ideal for rockeries where the surroundings set off their closely tufted foliage and large open trumpets.

- BAMBOO. THESE ARE GIANT GRASSES AND CARE SHOULD BE TAKEN WHEN USING SELECTIVE WEEDKILLERS DESIGNED TO DESTROY COUCH OR OTHER GRASSES AS THEY WILL ALSO KILL BAMBOO. FLOWERING MAY TAKE PLACE, DEPENDING ON VARIETIES, FROM 5 TO 60 YEARS AND IN SOME CASES THE PLANT WILL DIE. BAMBOOS PREFER WELL DRAINED SOIL AND A POSITION SHELTERED FROM STRONG WIND.

In our listing we have divided the bamboo into two groups:-

(1) CLUMP FORMING OR NON SUCKERING VARIETIES.

With these the underground stem is very short and the size of the clump increases slowly.

- ARUNDINARIA FALCATA. (B. GRACILIS). Slender canes up to 10 feet in height, numerous graceful branches at every node. Leaves ½in. to 1in. wide and up to 6in. long. \$2.50
- ARUNDINARIA NITIDA. Straight dark flush purple stems up to 10 feet in height. Graceful habit. Thrives best in light shade and is an excellent tub plant. \$3.00
- BAMBUSA MULTIPLEX ALPHONSE KARI. Canes bright yellow striped green up to 12ft. in height. Leaves ½in. wide and up to 4in. long. \$3.00



ATOLL (MElbystar 734F) Hybrid Tea. Large double flowers, satin vermilion on the inside of the petals, porcelain rose on the outside. The flower is double, 5in. diameter, and of a globular shape. Citrus are generally hardier than is supposed, and, provided shelter from cutting winds, a reasonably good soil and full sun are provided, good results may be expected in most districts. Lisbon and Eureka Lemons succeed in North Island gardens sheltered from heavy frosts. Meyer Lemon gives best results in colder districts. Oranges and Mandarins will prosper in all mild districts. With citrus, particularly Oranges and Mandarins, the fruit borne on young trees is usually disappointing, thick skinned and dry fleshed, but as the tree establishes the fruit becomes larger, thinner skinned and full of juice.

All citrus resent deep cultivation; their fine feeding surface roots dislike disturbance. A well-drained soil, annual mulching with decayed

farmyard manure, compost or the like is required.

Although our stock of citrus trees is certified clean and disease free
by the Department of Agriculture, Government regulations prohibit citrus
trees being sent into the Northland, Auckland Provinces and Hawke's
Bay County from other parts of New Zealand. We regret therefore that
we cannot supply citrus to clients in these areas.
